POLICY BRIEF: SUPPORTING GRASSROOTS FEMINIST ORGANISATIONS FROM A FEMINIST PERSPECTIVE: LESSONS LEARNT FROM THE GLOBAL CAPITALISATION OF THE 'FON' MODEL

At a time when feminist movements are facing shrinking civic space, increasing anti-rights backlash, and declining access to flexible funding, the **FON** model demonstrates that another form of international cooperation is possible: one grounded in trust, autonomy, flexibility, and movement-building.

The **FON** (Feminist Opportunities Now) programme represents a concrete example of the operationalisation of a feminist approach to support the strengthening of feminist ecosystems.

The **"FON model"** is characterised by its alignment with feminist values — trust, horizontality, respect for autonomy, inclu-

sivity, care — and by its ability to adapt to diverse contexts and organisations. Its impact is not limited to strengthening the supported organisations: the programme has also brought about a significant transformation in the practices, stances and intervention methods of the consortium's organisations.

Against a backdrop of questioning traditional models of support and aid, the comprehensive evaluation of the **FON** project carried out in 2026 highlights key lessons for rethinking support mechanisms for feminist civil society, particularly grassroots organisations, and moving towards forms of cooperation more consistent with the values of feminist diplomacy.



FEMINIST OPPORTUNITIES NOW (FON) PROGRAMME

FON is a programme funded by the French Development Agency (AFD) and implemented between 2022 and 2026 by a consortium of five international organisations — Médecins du Monde, IPPF, CREA, Empow'Her and the FIDH — with the aim of strengthening the capacity of feminist movements to prevent and respond to gender-based violence.

The programme is being rolled out in ten countries across Africa, Latin America and Asia (Burkina Faso, Côte d'Ivoire, Guinea, Ethiopia, Kenya, Niger, Colombia, Mexico, Bangladesh

and Sri Lanka) and combines direct funding for feminist organisations, capacity-building, strategic guidance, advocacy support and movement-building.

The intervention model is based on a combination of complementary tools: grants to feminist organisations — including small groups or informal collectives — tailored technical support, project development, support for feminist networks and movements, and advocacy work at various levels.

KEY RESULTS AT ORGANISATIONAL LEVEL

- 210** Grassroots feminist organisations, networks and groups supported across 10 countries.
- 188** Grassroots feminist organisations, networks and groups supported across 10 countries.
- 223** Organisations took part in collective learning and capacity-building processes.
- 83** Organisations received specific support for their advocacy initiatives.
- 52** organisations secured new sources of funding outside the **FON** programme, thereby strengthening their long-term sustainability and resilience.

FON aims to strengthen the resilience, sustainability and influence of organisations, particularly smaller ones, to enable them to operate in complex contexts and to enhance their capacity to exert influence at local, national and international levels.

FON TOWARDS A MODEL OF FEMINIST SUPPORT

International cooperation continues to operate under rules that limit the potential of feminist movements: inflexible, short-term funding and unequal relationships.

In contexts of democratic crisis and shrinking civic space, these models are not only inadequate — they are part of the problem. In response to these limitations, the **FON** programme has sought to experiment with a different form of support, aligned with the principles and practices of feminist movements.

This is a model based on trust, autonomy and care, which recognises feminist organisations as political actors in their own right. It moves away from asymmetrical power dynamics in which organisations are often regarded merely as executors rather than as central actors in the production of knowledge and collective action.

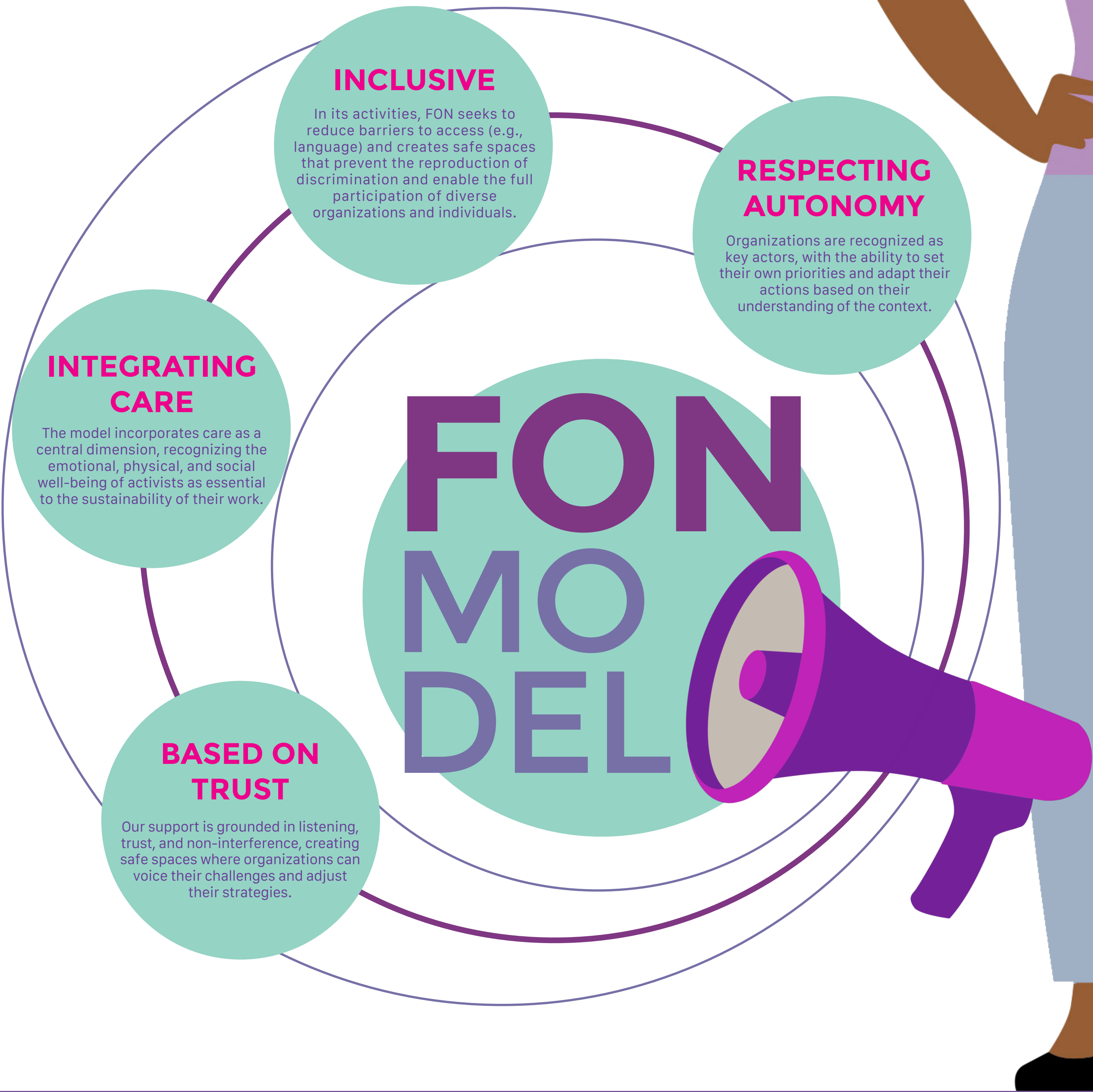
Furthermore, the programme places particular emphasis on support mechanisms, conceived as a central element of the model. Beyond funding, **FON** promotes relationships based on trust, active listening and non-interference, with a capacity for adaptation and responsiveness to the needs of organisations. This closeness allows support to be adjusted over time, to respond to unforeseen situations and to create an environment in which organisations can express their challenges without jeopardising the support they receive.

A transformation of practice

The implementation of the **FON** model has resulted in observable developments at two interrelated levels.

The programme has contributed to strengthening the supported feminist organisations, not only in terms of technical capacity, but also in terms of their strategic positioning, autonomy and coordination with other stakeholders.

Beyond strengthening individual organisations, **FON** has helped to consolidate feminist ecosystems by promoting collaboration, peer learning and collective advocacy. Flexible funding and tailored support have enabled organisations to strengthen their strategic positioning, participate in political processes and respond to changing political contexts. Across the programme, 138 organisations have built their capacity, 83 have received support for their advocacy initiatives and 223 have participated in collective learning processes.



STRATEGIC IMPLICATIONS FOR COOPERATION

FON's experience shows that there are other opportunities for cooperation between donors, funds, and philanthrop organizations and feminist movements and organizations.

FON's experience offers several strategic lessons for donors and cooperation actors seeking to support feminist movements and organisations more effectively:

1 FUND ORGANIZATIONS, NOT JUST PROJECTS

Shift the focus from project funding to organisational support. This involves moving from an approach centred on the implementation of predetermined activities to one that prioritises strengthening organisations' capacities, autonomy and sustainability over time. In practice, this requires designing funding mechanisms that cover structural costs, support strategic processes and adapt to changing contexts, rather than merely funding specific activities with predefined outcomes.

2 ADOPT AN ECOSYSTEMIC APPROACH

Move away from a logic of individual support for certain organisations, and prioritize a strategy combining different types of support and activities to strengthen feminist ecosystems, particularly the least represented segments (young feminist movements, organisations defending the rights of LGBTQI+ people, feminist organisations working on disability, sex workers, people living with HIV, feminist organisations in conflict-affected /politically restricted contexts, etc.).

3 ENSURE TRUE FLEXIBILITY

Introduce genuine flexibility into funding mechanisms, allowing for adaptations based on context and recognising the diversity of organisational trajectories. This involves offering various channels of support — for organisations, collectives and coalitions alike — and different operational modalities (amount, duration, etc.), whilst allowing organisations to define their own budgets and priorities according to their specific contexts.

4 TRANSFORM SUPPORT RELATIONSHIPS

Basing them on trust, active listening and respect for the autonomy of organisations, rather than reproducing hierarchical dynamics that lead to a donor-beneficiary dynamic rather than a partnership-based approach. This involves having a feminist support team that shares common values, is responsive and dedicated, and has adequate resources.

5 FUNDING CARE AND SAFETY

Incorporating aspects that are often overlooked in international cooperation, such as care (including self-care), the safety and digital security of activists, safe and accessible digital spaces, and the linguistic and political barriers that limit the participation of certain actors — all of which require sustained funding and long-term commitment.

FON should not be understood as an isolated pilot, but as a transferable framework for feminist cooperation capable of informing future funding mechanisms and partnership models.

MOVEMENTS THAT TRANSFORM

FROM DOCUMENTATION TO INTERNATIONAL ADVOCACY



Following a workshop on the ethical documentation of gender-based violence organized by FIDH, EMAF and IDHEAS documented the disappearances of women and girls linked to human trafficking in Mexico. Their report, **Who Is Looking for Us? Who Cares About Us?*, received significant national media coverage and, thanks to strategic support from **FON's** partners, was subsequently presented at the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) in New York.

This example illustrates how the combination of capacity-building, guidance, and advocacy support has enabled grassroots feminist organizations to highlight their evidence and influence international policy-making forums.

52 ORGANIZATIONS STRENGTHEN THEIR FINANCIAL AUTONOMY THANKS TO THE FON MODEL



Thanks to **FON's** personalized support, 52 feminist organizations have secured new sources of funding, strengthening their sustainability, strategic capabilities, and ability to develop collaborations within feminist ecosystems.

These results illustrate the importance of investing in the organizations themselves — and not just in their projects — to support their autonomy, capacity for innovation, and long-term impact.
